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The supposed Augustan arch at Pavia (Ticinum) and the Einsiedeln 326 manuscript

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One of the most frequently cited examples of Julio-Claudian dynastic imagery is a triumphal arch at Pavia (ancient Ticinum) in northern Italy, supposedly erected by Augustus and crowned by 10 statues of the Julio-Claudian family.¹ There are no remains of such an arch in Pavia, and the only evidence for its existence comes from the 9th-c. Einsiedeln 326 manuscript, a valuable topographical source for classical monuments and inscriptions within the city of Rome.² Folios 77-79 of this manuscript contain a travel itinerary of Rome which proceeds from the gate of St. Peter to the church of St. Paul fuori le mura and then presumably back again to St. Peter's (fig.1).³ Near the end of the itinerary, under the rubric "IN PORTA PAPIA", the monk listed in 3 parts a series of Julio-Claudian inscriptions which constitute 10 dedications in the dative case.⁴ In the first group appear Nero, son of Germanicus, Drusus the Younger, Germanicus, and Tiberius; in the second, Augustus and Livia; and in the third, Gaius and Lucius Caesar, Claudius, and Drusus Caesar son of Germanicus.⁵

When the monk copied the inscriptions, however, he treated all of the dedications as a single unit, reading from left to right rather than from top to bottom. Mommsen realised the monk's error and reconstructed their original appearance. His reconstruction has been emended by M. Stuart, *AJA* 40 (1936) 320 n.2 and 321 n.3. The rearrangement is as follows:

Section 1: **Nero Caesar** – Neroni Julio/Germanici [f.]/Aug. pronepoti/Caesari;

Drusus, son of Tiberius – D[ruso] Julio Ti.] f./ Augusti nepoti/Divi pron. Caesari/ pontifici;

Germanicus – Germanico/ Julio Ti./Augusti nepot./Divi pron. Caesari/augurique;

Tiberius – Ti. Caesari/Augusti f./Divi nepot. pont./cos.ter.Imp.ter./tribuniciae potestatis VIII

Section 2: **Augustus** – Imp.Caesari/Divi f. Augusto/pontific. maximo/ patri patriae Aug. XVVir S.F. VIIVir Epulon/cos. XIII Imp. XVII tribunic. potest. XXX;

Livia – Livia<e>/Drusi f./uxori Caesaris Aug.

Section 3: **Gaius Caesar** – [C.] Caesari/ Augusti f./Divi nepot./pontific. cos./imperator;

Lucius Caesar – <L.> Caesari/ Augusti f./ Divi nepot./auguri cos. design./principi iuventutis;

Drusus Caesar – Druso Julio/Germanici f./Aug. pronepot./Germanico;

Claudius – Ti. Claudio/Drusi Germanici f./Neroni Germanico.
